EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S COLUMN

“So, what is with the two logos on the front of this newsletter?” you may be asking. Capuchin Youth & Family Ministries isn’t changing, but we believe it is important to communicate something a bit different with our logo. Since CYFM began in the mid 1970’s, it has been a ministry of the Capuchin Province of St. Mary. Not everyone is aware of this. We believe it is time to make our relationship with the Province clearer. So, we are retiring our unique CYFM logo and we are adopting the logo of the Capuchin Province of St. Mary.

I have been reading a book, *Change is Good: You Go First*. The title says so much. We profess to be willing to change, to grow, to move on, and to improve, but there is a part of us that likes the comfort of, “the way it has always been.” Why a new logo?

We are proud of our association with the Capuchin Province of St. Mary. The Capuchins are a religious order of brothers and priests who belong to the Franciscan family. They are in 101 countries around the world and there are about 11,000 members. The Province of St. Mary is a section of the Capuchin Family. It is also known as the New York and New England Province. There are about 125 members of this Province. We have been blessed tremendously in that the Province of St. Mary has assigned friars to serve the CYFM community over the years. They have been dedicated apostles with a vision and passion for rebuilding the young church and supporting families in their journeys of faith. The Province of St. Mary has also been very generous in subsidizing the costs associated with this ministry that have not been covered by registration fees and fund raising.

By using this new logo we are highlighting our relationship with the Province. CYFM is an important part of something greater – The Capuchin Province of St. Mary. Our use of the logo will also reflect positively on the

Province as well. CYFM is a vital and exciting ministry in the Church. People will know that the Province deserves the credit for supporting and empowering all that we do for young people and their families.

For those who visit our web site, the change will be even clearer. In the past, CYFM has had its own web site. We had a link to the Capuchin Province of St. Mary’s web site, and to the web sites of other ministries of the Province.

SISTER DEATH

For many of us, death is a pretty scary thing. Death may conjure up images of the Grim Reaper or other ghoulish Halloween associations. Other times our thoughts might drift towards the cold earth where our bodies will be resting. Perhaps we fear the pain of death itself or worry that death would be the finality of existence.

Yet, our Christian faith gives us a much different view of death. The liturgy for Christian Burial proclaims, "Life has changed, not ended". We believe that through our baptism we have died with Christ and so too we share in Christ's resurrection. We see death as a birth into eternal life. It is the beginning of resurrected life into the mystical body of Christ.

St. Francis routinely contemplated his own mortality. He became so comfortable with the idea that he began to see death as a welcomed guest. In his famous poem *The Canticle of the Creatures* (which was the theme of last year's R&R retreat) Francis gave this future guest the very personal name of "Sister Death". He longed for Sister Death's embrace and

the ultimate meeting of the Risen Lord. Like many saints, Francis saw death as a completion of his life's work in this time and space. He looked forward to the new time and space where he would live in God's eternal love and infinite mercy.



The feast of St. Francis is October 4th. The night before this feast, millions of Franciscans around the world gather to commemorate the *Transitus* – St. Francis' passing from this life to the next. We retell the story of the night Francis died. Often we reenact how the brothers gathered around Francis, read his favorite scripture passage (Jn 13:1-17), broke bread together, listened to Francis' last instructions, and received his final blessing. (They even ate

Francis' favorite cookies!) In this beautiful prayer service we often retell many important stories in the life of St. Francis. It's a powerful reminder of St. Francis' influence and inspiration in our lives and in today's world. It's a sad time, but also a time to rejoice.

I love how this feast falls in early October. This great Franciscan feast coincides with beautiful and vibrant colors of fall. Nature is bursting with life and preparing for the death-like slumber of winter. It is as if nature is encouraging us to reflect on change, transition, and death.

I believe St. Francis helps us to see death differently than our popular culture does. Francis saw death as the defining moment with God. His life was crescendoing towards this goal. He knew Christ's victory over death as his own victory. He knew the promise of eternal joy in God's heavenly banquet. Francis is enjoying this new life and it is our life's quest to share it too.

St. Francis and the Scriptures: For a moment I would like you to think of someone you love very much. Someone you haven't seen for a few months or a year or more. Perhaps this person is a member of your family or a close friend. If I were to tell you that I have a letter from that person and I am going to read it to you, I believe you would become a bit excited and would listen attentively. Perhaps when I finished you would ask me to reread it and if it was someone we all knew we might even pass the letter around so we can all see it. In fact, this is what we do every time we read the Scriptures. We read a letter from someone we all love and who loves us very much. The words of the scriptures have just as much meaning for us today as they did for the early Christians of the first century. Some people I know even buy a pocket edition so they can carry it around with them. In the Greek Rite of Investiture for monks, a novice is given no other text but the Gospel.



he exclaimed: "This is what I am looking for, this is what I must do with all my heart." He realized that God was also speaking to him personally, so that later in his life he could say: "No man showed me what I ought to do but the most High himself told me that I should live after the manner of the Holy Gospel." Whenever he had an important decision to make Francis would go to the scriptures and open it to find the answer. If he couldn't attend Mass because of sickness he would have the scripture passages read to him so he wouldn't miss the word of God.

To read the scriptures in any other way it becomes just a history book telling us about the early church. How do we read the scriptures? Like St. Francis, let us read it as the living word of God speaking to us today. Our Savior promises peace of heart to us if we do so. "If anyone loves me he will keep my word, and my father will love him and we shall come to him and make our home with him. Peace I give to you, my peace I give you, a peace the world cannot give, this is my gift to you." John 14:23

MEET OUR RENTERS – KAIROS OUTSIDE THE WALLS

CYFM is not only a retreat center for youth ministry, but it opens its door to house many other ministry events during the year. Each month, many schools, parishes and other organizations rent the CYFM building to hold their own retreat. In this newsletter, we are featuring the **Kairos Outside the Walls** ministry.

Featured is an interview with Linda Falcone, with the Kairos Outside the Walls ministry:

What is the Kairos ministry about?

It is a Christian ministry that hosts a retreat weekend to show God's love to women who have someone they know incarcerated.

What's special about this particular retreat?

Basically, these women are hurting, feeling alone, lost and feeling like they're not part of a community because they get ostracized just like the inmates do. So this weekend is geared to show them that they are not alone and they are loved by their community and by God.

We have talks, through which we share own lives so the women understand they're not the only ones who are going through things. Mainly it's a support system showing them we're not alone and we depend on God.

Why do you do this type of ministry?

I always wanted to be involved in a ministry working with people in prison. Someone introduced me to this program. I got to see how women come in very hard, tight and angry and how by Sunday they look 10 years younger. They relax and they have received a blessing from God. That's why I stay with it.

How many people get involved?

Usually, there are 32 people on team, but we can have anywhere from 32 to 40 team members. We have anywhere from 16 to 21 women on retreat with us.

What would you like the community to know about your ministry?

All of our money that is raised is through donations. That's how we pay for the women's retreat and all the food. We run based off of community donations.

CAPUCHIN APPALACHIAN MISSION (CAM)
